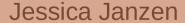

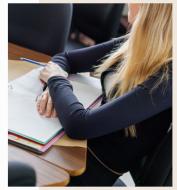

Making Sense of Anxiety in Kids

with Dr. Deborah MacNamara



Anxiety is the most common mental health issue among children and teens today, yet it is also one of the most misunderstood. From worries and compulsions to phobias and puzzling behaviors, anxiety wears many faces. In this keynote, Dr. Deborah MacNamara offers a fresh, developmental perspective on what anxiety really is, why it shows up, and how adults can create the conditions for children to find rest and resilience.

Finding Your 'Well': An Educator's Unexpected Path to Long-Term Well-Being with Mary Hewitt

This session examines the impacts of societal messaging and pressures ("the cultural backpack") on the educator today and explores ways to "return to self", following intuition instead of expectation, and approach life and work from a place of being 'well' (according to their own inner compass), instead of being 'good' (according to other's standards, needs, and expectations). This highly-liberating, heart-opening session is sure to empower educators to let go of what's unhelpful and diminishing... allowing true nourishment and intentional living to emerge both professionally and personally.

Letting Children Feel, Think, and Problem Solve

with Ana Valle Rivera

In this session, we explore practical strategies to foster critical thinking, emotional intelligence, and problem-solving skills in young children within Early Childhood Education (ECE) settings. The goal of this session is for educators to embrace pedagogical practices that create conditions that support confident, resilient, and independent thinking in young children.

In this session participants will:

- Explore the foundations that underpin critical thinking, emotional intelligence, and problem-solving skills in early childhood.
- Discuss the role of play, exploration, and fostering growth mindset.
- Consider ways to foster emotional intelligence in young children.
- Reflect on pedagogical choices that promote self-awareness, empathy, self-regulation, and problem-solving skills.

Creating Classrooms that Works: Strategies for Success with Ana Valle Rivera



Classroom management can be challenging for many Early Childhood Educators. Sometimes it feels like nothing is working, and burnout is coming for us. In this engaging and practical session, Early Childhood Educators explore the many aspects of classroom management and the effective strategies to set up classrooms for success. "Creating Classrooms that Work" focuses on empowering and inspiring educators with tools to support inclusive environments where all children can participate to the best of their abilities.

In this session, educators will learn:

- Establishing clear expectations with children and families
- Setting children up for success with predictable and smooth routines
- Meeting children's needs with adaptations and modifications

"You're Not the Boss of Me": The Science of Resistance in Kids with Dr. Deborah MacNamara

From toddler tantrums to teenage defiance, resistance is one of the most challenging behaviors adults face. Yet this instinct to oppose — what developmental science calls counterwill — is a normal, even healthy, part of growing up. In this session, Dr. Deborah MacNamara unpacks the roots of resistance, why children are driven to push back, and how adults can respond in ways that preserve connection while guiding growth.

Supporting Sensory Overload in Toddlers and Preschoolers: Tools for Calm and Connection in a classroom



with Bengisu Gonul

This session introduces sensory processing differences and explores how these differences can deeply impact behavior, learning, and social participation in young children. Participants will learn to identify common sensory challenges in toddlers and preschoolers - such as hypersensitivity to sound, touch, or movement - and how these might show up as distress, withdrawal, or "challenging behaviors." Through real-life examples, case scenarios, and hands-on demonstrations, school staff will learn how to use developmentally appropriate sensory tools and strategies to support regulation and engagement in early learning settings.

Designing for Differences: Creating Sensory-Smart Classrooms That Support Regulation, Personality, and Emotional Wellbeing

with Bengisu Gonul

This session equips educators with practical tools to support diverse learners by combining two key lenses: sensory regulation and individual personality styles. Participants will explore how environmental factors interact with each student's sensory-emotional profile and impact nervous system regulation. Educators will also gain insight into how traits such as sensitivity, flexibility, introversion, or intensity often reflect deeper sensory and emotional processing patterns - not misbehavior. The session focuses on creating inclusive spaces and routines that help all children feel safe, understood and ready to learn.



As part of this training, educators are briefly introduced to the Foundational Model™ from Great Kids Place - a neurodevelopmental framework that highlights how sensory, motor, emotional, and relational foundations shape behavior and learning. This model helps educators recognize when challenging behaviors may stem from unmet foundational needs and respond with empathy-based strategies instead of behavior management alone.



Culturally Relevant Pedagogical Practices in ECE: Supporting Newcomer Families and Children to Foster Belonging and Wellbeing in Early Learning and Childcare

with Nidhi Menon



This interactive session invites Early Childhood Educators to engage in critical reflection and dialogue about supporting newcomer families and children in early learning environments. Grounded in love, commitment, emotional professionalism, and culturally relevant pedagogy, this session will create space to share practices, generate ideas, and build strategies that nurture belonging and wellbeing. Together, we will consider how diverse perspectives can enrich our work and open new possibilities for building strong, inclusive relationships within communities.

Mentoring Matters: Supporting Growth in Every Role

with Marcia Nicole

Whether welcoming new colleagues or guiding students in placement, mentorship is a vital and often informal part of early learning. This session explores how to approach mentorship with intentionality, empathy, and clarity fostering professional growth for both the mentor and mentee.

Educators will be invited to see their daily interactions as opportunities to lead, support, and inspire.





Play and Regulation with Jess Finlay



with Jess Finlay

An information session on the vital role of play in supporting emotional regulation in children. This session will explore how different types of play—such as sensory play, imaginative play, and movement-based play—can help children explore emotions, build resilience, and develop self-regulation skills in a natural and engaging way. We will discuss how play provides a safe space for children to express feelings, experiment with coping strategies, and develop the foundations for social-emotional learning. Practical examples will be shared on how to recognize when children are using play to process emotions—such as repetitive themes, role-play scenarios, or changes in play intensity—and how adults can support and respond to this in the moment by joining in, offering co-regulation, and creating a safe, responsive environment.

Do you every wonder "does that I do really make a different?" Together, we will unpack your role as an ECE in the care of children and their families. We will dig into your image of a child, your image of a family and your image of an educator. Through a power point presentation, open discussion and interactive experiences you will learn about things like attachment, self-regulation and co-regulation. Let's get back to our root and answer the question, "does what I do really matter?".





Move Smart, Stay Safe: Workplace Injuries and Prevention for Early Childhood Educators



with Dr. Julia McKenna & Dr. Kelsey Haslam

Working with children is rewarding but can be tough on our body. This interactive presentation provides an evidence-based overview of common workplace injuries affecting early childhood educators and outlines effective prevention strategies. Participants will gain practical knowledge on safe work practices, ergonomic techniques for lifting and bending, and targeted exercises designed to reduce injury risk, promote musculoskeletal health, and support overall well-being in the workplace.



Rooted in Purpose: Reconnecting with Your Why as an Educator with Nathalie Arsenault

In the day-to-day demands of early childhood education, it's easy to lose sight of the deep purpose that first inspired you to work with young children. This interactive session will help you reconnect with your 'why'- the core reason you chose this profession- so you can leave feeling re-energized and motivated. Through reflective exercises, engaging discussions, and hands-on activities, you'll gain clarity on what drives you, explore ways to sustain your passion, and connect with fellow educators who share your commitments to sharing young lives. Whether you're seeking inspiration, validation, or a renewed sense of purpose, this session will prove a meaningful space to reignite your passion for the vital work you do.





Centre Culture Check-In: Strengthening Belonging & Professional Identity with Marcia Nicole



Culture is shaped by how we show up for each other every day. This session invites educators and leaders to explore the emotional and relational landscape of their Centre, and to examine how intentional practices can strengthen belonging, respect, and professional pride. Together, we will consider how to co-create environments where everyone feels welcome, engaged, and part of something meaningful.

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From Sensory Processing to Sentences: Unlocking Early Learning Potential with Allied Therapy



Supporting Late Talkers through Collaboration and Occupational Therapy and Speech-Language Pathology.

For many children, delayed speech is not just about language, it is connected to how their bodies process and respond to the world around them. This session highlights how Occupational Therapy (OT) and Speech-Language Pathology (SLP) work hand-in-hand to support late talkers by addressing the whole child.

Through real-world examples, we will demonstrate how sensory regulation, play skills and motor development set the stage for language growth. Parents and professionals will discover practical strategies to build a strong foundation for communication, from creating supportive daily routines to encourage interactive play.

Participants will leave with tools to foster both sensory and language development.

Beyond Words: Giving Every Child a Voice with Allied Therapy

Exploring Alternative and Augmentative Communication (AAC) for Non-Speaking Children.

Every child deserves the chance to express their thoughts, needs and personality. This may be through speech, signs, or technology. This session introduces families and educators to the power of Alternative and Augmentative Communication (AAC) for children who are non-speaking or have significant communication challenges.

We will explore a range of AAC options, from picture systems and communication boards to high-tech speech-generating devices, and discuss how to choose tools that fit a child's unique strengths.

Participants will learn how to support communication growth at home, school, and in the community, and how AAC can reduce frustration while opting doors to social connection and learning.





Feeding Children in Child Care: Building Healthy Habits Early with Health PEI



This engaging and practical presentation is designed for daycare staff who play a vital role in shaping children's eating habits. Led by registered dietitians, the session will explore age-appropriate nutrition, strategies for managing picky eating, and the importance of creating a positive mealtime environment. Participants will learn how to support children's growth and development through balanced meals and snacks, understand portion sizes, and foster independence and curiosity around food. The presentation will also address common challenges in group feeding settings and offer actionable tips for promoting healthy relationships with food from an early age.

Fueling Growth, Energy & Joy: Nutrition Strategies for Early Childhood Educators with Crystal MacGregor

This session explores the value of process-based art as a foundation for creativity, problem-solving, and self-expression in early childhood education. Participants will examine the differences between product-focused and process-focused approaches, discovering how open-ended materials and experiences foster critical thinking, resilience, and intrinsic motivation. Practical strategies, real-life examples, and hands-on activities will demonstrate how educators can create environments that encourage exploration and creativity while supporting early literacy and developmental goals.

Whole Brain Teaching in the Classroom: Strategies to support positive emotional and behavioral growth in early childhood

with Nicole MacRae



The past decade has seen significant advancements in understanding how children learn, and how their brains develop. This research has changed the way in which we parent and teach children, as we now understand that learning occurs when we engage children across multiple senses. In the classroom, it means we are utilizing mind AND body as often as we can, and creating hands-on, experiential learning whenever possible. It means moving away from just auditory and visual learning.

and utilizing emotional social goalposts to guide our way. By utilizing Whole Brain Teaching in the classroom, we are also uncovering new and innovative ways to engage children, develop their social and emotional learning centres, access both hemispheres to optimize learning as well as deal with challenging behaviors in a more grounded, empowered and confidence way. During this session we will explore various skills and outcomes we want children to develop in an early learning environment, and how Whole Brain Teaching can give us the tools and strategies to help them achieve these goals. This session will use real-world examples and case studies, as well as small and large group activities to ensure Whole Brain activation during our session too!

How to Improve Your Day: Use Visuals!

Using visuals provides predictability and reassurance throughout the day. They offer a sense of certainty, helping children understand what's happening and what's expected. For educators and SLPs, visuals are a powerful tool to ensure that our messages are being received clearly—they're an additional layer of communication that supports comprehension.

Visuals aren't just about managing behavior—they're about supporting understanding, expression, and engagement. They help children process language, express themselves, and participate meaningfully in classroom routines and play.

This presentation will explore how to use visuals effectively to:

- Support receptive language (understanding what we say)
- Encourage expressive communication (sharing thoughts and needs)
- Promote positive interactions and play
- Foster smoother transitions and classroom routines

This will be an interactive session, with opportunities for hands-on participation and discussion!

Use of Drama and Role Play to Support Emotional Growth

with Nicole MacRae

For several decades research has been investigating how various forms of prosocial play supports child development. Through this research, we have uncovered that using imaginary role play and drama based interventions can significantly improve a child's social, emotional and cognitive development. Skills such as enhanced communication, problem solving, processing and regulating emotions improved self-confidence and self-awareness have all been observed. Additionally, kids who engage in these creative interventions in their learning environments also develop increased empathy, cooperation,



and conflict resolution skills. This session will be evidence-based and will walk participants through the importance of Drama and Role Play, as well as creative ways to utilize these play-based interventions in their day to day work. Participants will be asked to participate in small and large group activities during this session, as well as have the opportunity to discuss real life case examples and how Drama and Role Play might support the kids they are working with.







Jessica Janzen (she/her)

Jessica Janzen is a motivational speaker, coach, entrepreneur, author, philanthropist, wife to 'Hot Ronnie', mother of three and go-getter. Born and raised on her family farm in Manitoba she now owns the title of city slicker and calls Calgary, Alberta home. Jessica is not only an advocate for mental health, rare diseases, and all things joy, but also a total live wire.

As the Co-Founder of The Love for Lewiston Foundation, Jessica has raised over \$2.5 million to support SMA research and medical care, and was pivotal in implementing Newborn Screening for Spinal Muscular Atrophy in Alberta. And continues to support the Alberta Children's Hospital. Her best-selling book, Bring The Joy, encourages readers to reconnect with themselves and find joy during the most difficult times.

Jessica's contributions have been recognized with several prestigious awards, including Calgary's Top 40 Under 40.

Behind all of her titles and awards, she is a helper who wants you to unlock a clear pathway from adversity to achievement that will help you accomplish any goal or dream.

Her mission is to help you shift your perspective, get curious and teach you how to bring the joy, to whatever you face.



Lucas Arsenault (he/him)

Lucas Arsenault is a professional kiteboarder, national champion, and internationally recognized athlete from Prince Edward Island, Canada. For years, he dominated the sport, pushing the limits of what was possible on the water. But in May 2024, his life took a dramatic turn when he survived a harrowing shark attack—an experience that tested every ounce of his strength, resilience, and will to live.

His incredible survival story is one of quick thinking, unbreakable determination, and the power of the human spirit. Facing life- altering injuries, Lucas refused to let the moment define him. Instead, he embraced the challenge head-on, proving that adversity can be the foundation for an even greater comeback.

Now, as a speaker, Lucas shares his journey of resilience, adaptation, and perseverance, inspiring audiences to overcome their own obstacles. His powerful message resonates with athletes, business leaders, and anyone navigating change, reminding them that true strength comes from how we rise after the fall.

Dr. Deborah MacNamara (she/her)

Dr. Deborah MacNamara is a clinical counsellor, author, and educator who makes developmental science come alive for parents, educators, and helping professionals. A faculty member of the Neufeld Institute and founder of Kids Best Bet, she translates relational and developmental science into practical wisdom that restores confidence in the adult's role. Deborah is the author of the bestselling book Rest, Play, Grow: Making Sense of Preschoolers (or anyone who acts like one), and Nourished: Connection, Food, and Caring for our Kids (and Everyone Else We Love), as well as the children's picture book The Sorry Plane. Her work has been translated into multiple languages and has reached audiences around the world. Drawing on over 25 years of clinical and teaching experience, Deborah weaves together neuroscience, developmental psychology, and attachment theory to help adults make sense of kids — from tantrums to anxiety to mealtimes — and to create the conditions where children can truly thrive. She lives in Vancouver, Canada, with her family, where she continues her writing, speaking, and teaching with a passion for bringing insight, heart, and humanity back to parenting, education, and emotional well-being.



Ana Valle Rivera (she/her)

Ana is a proud mother of three, a consultant, and the founder of Early Years Thriving. Since 2007, Ana has worked in various capacities in the early years field to support children, families, and educators. Ana has a background in ECE, a Bachelor's Degree in Child & Youth Care, and is nearing the completion of a Master's of Professional Education in Early Childhood Education.





Nidhi Menon (she/her)

Dr. Nidhi Menon is an Early Childhood Educator, mother, and advocate, as well as an Assistant Professor of Early Childhood Education in the Faculty of Education at the University of New Brunswick. She holds a Master's degree in Early Childhood Education from Iowa State University and a PhD in Social Justice Education from the University of Toronto. Her scholarship and advocacy are situated at the intersections of post-structural and marginalized feminist ontologies, ethics of care, and questions of power in the field of Early Childhood Studies. Drawing on perspectives of women of colour, her work examines and challenges dominant constructions of childhood and their impact on the lived experiences of marginalized families, children, and educators. Across her research, teaching, and advocacy, Dr. Menon is deeply committed to making visible the powerful, knowledgeable voices of underrepresented communities who continue to be positioned at the margins of society.



Jess Finlay (she/her)

Jess is an Australian trained Occupational Therapist with 13 years' experience in a variety of OT areas of practice, including pediatrics, palliative care, the cute care, case management, return to work rehabilitation and mental health. She graduated in 2010 with a bachelor of occupational therapy from the University of Sydney, Australia.

Jess is driven by understanding the uniqueness of neurodiversity, particularly in children and how this impacts their way in the world. Jess has additional training and experience in Sensory Processing, Autism/ ADHD, Self-regulation and Coaching and health care.
